On the first day of Term 4, all College staff worked together through a wonderful experience of personal reflection looking at our story as faith people. It was wonderful to hear our three presenters speak of their 'own faith story' during the day. As each of us becomes more attentive to our spirituality, and for the way we assist students in this conversation, this will be a powerful influence that can make a real difference for the students.

your support. Children supported the annual Mission Week Appeal through raising sponsors and funds and part of this was presented as our donation at the Diocesan Mission Mass. The remaining funds raised will be used to purchase some new classroom furniture to support 21st century learning.

During Weeks 3, 4 and 5 of this term, our Kindergarten 2018 children and parents were engaged in an Orientation Program in preparation for joining our MacKillop Community next year. We welcomed many new families and for many current families, another sibling. Whilst the children are getting to know each other and the school, parents are also getting to know each other and more about our Catholic Education framework, the Curriculum for Kindergarten and many of the "day-to-day" issues and activities of Kindergarten.

During the last weeks of Term 4, there are many activities to complete. 

IT HAS BEEN an exciting first few weeks of Term 4 with JUMP (Josphites Undertaking Mission Project) officially launched within the College. The primary aim of the program is to encourage students' to serve others in a positive spirit. Our Year 7 students' are the pioneers of this project. They are encouraged to identify areas of need within their homes, the local and wider community. Once areas of concern have been established, students' can then determine practical solutions to these problems and ways in which they can make a difference; whether it be through community service, or perhaps a fundraising event.

A number of students' are already participating in a number of community service activities which the College has to offer. Every Thursday afternoon a group of students' have been working on packaging goods as part of a Christmas appeal for the homeless, as well as to distribute to nursing homes in the local community. Others have been selling Zooper Doopers

every lunch time as part of a fundraising activity.

On the first Monday of every month, students' and their parents have been invited to attend Coast Shelter in Gosford. Students' prepare, cook and serve meals to financially disadvantaged and homeless people. Our first booking for this activity is already full and there has been a lot of positive interest for this community service.

Students' can also complete community service at home, for family or neighbours. They may wish to create their own fundraising event or raise awareness about a particular issue they feel strongly about. There are many ways for students' to get involved.

I am very proud on the way Year 7 have approached the JUMP Project. Their overall attitude and participation thus far has been excellent. I look forward to the many possibilities and opportunities the initiative will provide to our students'.









Celebrating Holy Communion

EVERY DAY REMINDS us of your love and care.

In Jesus, your Son, we have food from heaven, our daily bread.

Bless us as we prepare to receive Jesus in Holy Communion.

May we come closer to Jesus and to each other. Amen.

The sacrament of Holy Communion or Eucharist completes the Sacraments of Initiation. Together with Baptism and Confirmation, First Holy Communion establishes young people as fully fledged members of the faith. Catholic children around the age of 8 all over the world participate in this beautiful sacrament. Traditionally the candidates wear white to symbolise their innocence and the key symbols are bread and wine. For many of us, our First Holy Communion was a truly significant day, when our family and parish gathered together to celebrate this milestone in faith. When we participate in the sacraments of our children we renew our own faith journey.

The celebration of First Holy Communion was held at St

Mary of the Cross Mackillop Church on 10 September with two groups at 10am and 12pm. Each ceremony presented approximately 40 children over two services with Father Vince Casey presiding. The day was a lovely family and community event with the church at full capacity for both services. The Readings of the day recounted the story of The Last Supper when Jesus first shared the true meaning of the Eucharistic celebration. Children attended and listened as Father Vince talked about his experience of First Holy Communion and even shared his own Communion certificate. The students prepared for the sacrament by participating in four Parish-based lessons with volunteers as teachers of faith. The children received a Eucharist medallion as a gift and shared a wonderful cake after the ceremony.

A big thank you goes to all who helped with the organisation, planning and running of this special sacrament.









Helping the homeless

OUR YEAR 12 Student Leaders have made 'addressing Homelessness on the Central Coast" a focus for their leadership over the next 12 months. They are keen to link in with two specific organisations - Orange Sky Laundry and Coast Shelter.

Orange Sky Laundry is the world's first free mobile laundry service for the homeless. A crazy idea in 2014 to put two washing machines and two dryers in a van and wash and dry clothes for free. Starting in the streets of Brisbane, Orange Sky has now grown to 20 services across Australia in Brisbane, Canberra, Gold Coast, Melbourne, Sydney, Sunshine Coast, North and South Perth, Adelaide, Newcastle, SE Melbourne, Wollongong, SA Northern Districts, Port Macquarie, Mackay and Hobart. Orange Sky Laundry now does over 6.2 tonnes of

laundry every week. However most importantly, has over 1,300 hours of positive and genuine conversations every week.

Orange Sky laundry recently launched a service on the Central Coast and we had the pleasure of having Brendan, their Central Coast Vehicle Manager, address our School Assembly on the Friday 27 October. Brendan was delighted that our Senior Leaders want to focus on helping the homeless in our region and grateful for the opportunity to address our students. The senior student leaders will be looking at ways to raise funds for this tremendous service, as well as keeping close links to them as they continue to expand. We are hopeful that there may even be opportunities for our students to volunteer time for Orange Sky as part of the revamped Community Service Program in 2018.

CAN YOU IMAGINE not being able to read a newspaper, a road sign or directions on a bottle of medication? Sadly, this is a reality faced by many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders living in remote communities today.

The Indigenous Literacy Foundation (ILF) is a national charity that was founded and set up by members of the Australian book industry in 2005. It draws on the skills and expertise of the book industry to address children's literacy levels in remote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

The Foundations vision is to make a positive difference in the lives of Australian Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children by focusing on ways to improve their literacy levels. The children's future educational experiences can be greatly improved through enjoyable, positive engagements with books in family and community environments.

In true MacKillop style students and staff helped by donating their unwanted books to the school and then in Term 3 they were sold for 50c each. We raised a total of \$481.95 and the proceeds were sent to the Indigenous Literacy Foundation to improve the literacy of Indigenous children living in remote areas of Australia. We thank our parents, staff and students that supported this initiative which will help to continue the vision of the Indigenous Literacy Foundation.





The children have lots of fun and become much safer for the experience when enjoying our local beaches in their own time.
