OVER RECENT WEEKS two very unconnected things have had a very positive effect on my wellbeing as a person and as a Principal. Amidst all the challenges and stresses in life, something beautiful and wonderful takes hold of you and reshapes your thinking. The first wonderful happening was the safe arrival of my first grandchild, Luca who was born in late May. The absolute joy of this occasion has provided such warmth to my family. I believe Luca's arrival has reshaped me for renewing my connection to the journey of a child with their family from ages 0 to 18. For this, I am most grateful and I look forward to walking the journey from Kinder to Year 12 with our MacKillop families.

The other experience was attending the Josephite Secondary Schools (AJASS) Conference in Adelaide in early June. Both Deb Ferguson and I attended the conference and the theme was 'At the heart of Josephite Education'. With about 30 schools being represented from all parts of Australia, we were able to listen to speakers, discuss and discern the essential values that underpin Josephite education. The Sisters of St. Joseph support these gatherings and the spirit amongst these schools encourages us to turn the pages over for discovering new ways to support children and families by engaging with a Catholic school education with a Josephite heart.

Rejoining the College community allowed me to listen to 30 aspiring Year 11 students seeking to be selected as leaders for our College in 2018/19. The speeches spoke glowingly of their love for the College, its people, and their families and for the privilege and honour of stepping up to become leaders. A

leadership camp followed at Kincumber and student leaders connected with each other. In offering their vision, the new College Captains were discerned via a meritorious selection process. So many staff members support this process and both Mrs Ferguson and I are very grateful to Glen Taragel our Year 11 Pastoral Coordinator for supporting and coordinating the selection process. The new College Captains and senior leaders will be announced in Week 2 of Term 3 at a special assembly.

The recent reshaping of our Primary staff leadership team has seen Mrs Allison Passafaro join our Primary Team of acting leaders, as Acting RE Coordinator for the remainder of 2018. We warmly welcome Allison to her new role and we look forward to working with her as part of the overall College Executive.

Parents may be aware that the Australian Bishops
Conference has sought the approval of Pope Francis to hold
a Plenary Council to assist the reshaping of the Australian
Catholic Church. Pope Francis has approved this and a
process will be conducted over the remainder of 2018 into
2019 for the Plenary Council to be held in 2020. For MacKillop
families we will be offered the opportunity to add our voice
to the conversation via a process that will involve a local
animator. Training will be undertaken and the opportunity
to connect to the Plenary Council will be offered in the near

### Mission accomplished

OUR COLLEGE HOUSES at MacKillop link us all to the story of Mary of the Cross and her journey. I feel very blessed to have visited Fitzroy in Melbourne and stood where Mary's childhood home existed. I was in Rome for Mary's canonization and spent time in the Gesu Church where Mary spent many happy hours praying and contemplating whilst waiting for an audience with the Pope. Each year we take Year 7 to Mary MacKillop Place in North Sydney, where Alma Cottage sits in the middle of the complex and is where Mary spent her final years and to Kincumber where Mary established a Home for boys.

Two years ago Mr Steve Todd and I travelled to a conference in New Zealand and visited Temuka where Mary set up her first school on the South Island. This left only one House location to visit and I feel very privileged to have accomplished the visit this term.

Mr Steve Todd and I attended the annual AJASS (Association of Josephite Affiliated Secondary Schools) Conference, which is attended by Principals in Josephite schools from around Australia and New Zealand in Week 7 in Adelaide. Penola is approximately 4 hours south of Adelaide and is the site of Mary's first school which she opened just over 150 years ago. Penola is home to a wonderful museum and where the original school site stood, there is now a beautiful park with a sound system that explains the history of Mary, Fr Julian Tenison Wood and the first school. It is well worth the stop to experience a piece of Josephite history.

To understand our past we often need to walk in the

shoes of those in that time and I hope all our families and/ or students will also have the opportunity to visit all six of our House sites and remember the incredible woman who loved God unconditionally and trusted him at all times to provide. A wonderful role model for us all and a true inspiration.

THIS YEAR THE Bishop's Art Prize took a focus on the Illuminated Word of God. As any of you who have seen the Book of Kels in Dublin's Trinity College know the beauty and wonder of this painstaking artistic response to sacred text. This artform, also known as Biblical-micography, is an activity where artists take time to ponder and deepen their understanding of scripture through contemplative writing. Students were asked to select a favourite piece of sacred scripture from the Old or New Testament and illustrate it using a traditional or contemporary form of illumination. Students in Kindergarten and Year 1 were encouraged to submit an illustration of a Biblical story or verse. Students received awards at Participation, High Commendation and Finalist levels. The finalists in each stage will participate at the diocesan level during the 'Sweeter than Honey' Conference in Week 1 of Term 3. Winners will be notified via the school.
















### Science Alliance

#### The virtual world of Science Alliance, Ryan Herbert.

**ON WEDNESDAY 6** June, 30 students set off to Sydney to hear a lecture designed to respond to the question 'What will we create with virtual reality?'

With this in mind, we delved into the world of virtual reality, which is no longer limited to science fiction movies or video games, to find out what the future holds. Our group discovered how rapid advances in technology in the past ten years has made the seemingly impossible possible. Associate



Professor, Hamish MacDougall, took us on a virtual reality journey showcasing some of the immersive ways that this new technology can be used.

Dementia specialist, Professor Olivier Piguet, revealed how virtual reality now provides opportunities to examine behaviours in ways that would otherwise be impossible in real life. The group learned how virtual reality can be used to test memory functions in a safe and controlled environment, or to assess social cognition in a more sophisticated way.

With its increasing affordability, this technology has opened the door to novel ways to teach, measure cognition and behaviour, and to design flexible interventions to treat various mental disorders and cognitive deficits.

Despite struggling through the Sydney traffic, the group experienced the eery darkness of the University of Sydney campus and enjoyed the informative and easy to follow lecture. It showed us some incredible applications of an emerging technology. Many thanks to Mrs Thompson for joining us on our latest Science Alliance expedition.

### Insight day

**ON WEDNESDAY 20** June, three of our students travelled with Mrs Kerrie Pearce and myself to the University of Newcastle to participate in the Schools to University Insight Day. The day is organised by The Wollotuka Institute and is committed to empowering Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students in Year 10 to make informed decisions involving their future educational pathways and career trajectories.

The day began with a special Welcome to Country by Elder in Residence, Aunty Bronwyn Chambers, spoken in traditional Darkinjung language.

Our group heard from current Indigenous university students about their journey to tertiary education. The group participated in workshops throughout the day which included faculty focused activities:

- · Faculty of Health & Medicine using medical equipment and learning safe practices to maintain infection control.
- Children services at TAFE observing a child care facility and the activities involved in early childhood.
- Faculty of Science using various scientific tools to measure their strength, dexterity and coordination.
- Faculty of Engineering & Built Environment learning how to program software to achieve an outcome.
- Hospitality at TAFE learning to prepare and present a restaurant quality table.

This was a fun and informative day for all involved and it was a pleasure to see how interested our students were.

STUDENTS OF YEAR 8 and 9 had the opportunity to take part in an educational incursion focused on under age binge drinking. The SMASHED Project is a global theatre-in-education program visiting schools across Australia and around the world. The focus of the production is to break the culture of underage drinking and reduce alcohol related harm amongst young people.

The production went for 60 minutes and it allowed the students to interact with the actors throughout the performance. Students were exposed to the pressures young people face with regards to alcohol and they were educated on the dangers and consequences they will face should they engage in such behaviour. As part of the interaction, students worked with the actors to identify the skills required when faced with peer pressure and how to walk away from such situations.



The production was well enjoyed and students left with the confidence to make better choices and have a responsible attitude towards alcohol.

strengthening. The participation was exceptional, and the Collaroy staff were once again impressed by the way MacKillop students conducted themselves in a public forum.

# A visit from Tony Trimingham

#### Our seniors hear it from the source, John McNamara.

ON TUESDAY 5 June, the College had the privilege of hosting Tony Trimingham, CEO of Family Drug Support, to hold discussions with our Year 11 and 12 students. Family Drug Support was formed in 1997 after Tony lost his son, Damien, to a heroin overdose. Bereft, Tony felt frustrated by the general apathy and ignorance of his own experience. This was the plight of so many other individuals and families. Tony realised it was but the tip of the iceberg. When he realised this he called a public meeting. Hundreds of people turned up. People who had also been impacted upon by loved ones experiencing drug abuse. From this meeting Family Drug Support was formed. Family Drug Support is a caring, non-judgemental organisation, primarily made up of volunteers, all of who have experienced first-hand the trauma and chaos of having family members with drug dependency.

In his presentation to our students, Tony detailed aspects of Damien's upbringing and the characteristics of his family. Damien Trimingham was brought up in a happy middle class family, one that would match the characteristics of most of our families here at MacKillop. He was an athlete of some talent and actively took part in a range of sports, much like most of our students. The power of Tony's story is that when he first details the background of his family and Damien's life journey, our students recognise it matches up with the life journey of many of them. In a very special way, our students are able to walk in Damien's shoes and reflect on just how easily things can change quickly. Damien Trimingham was 22 years old when he died from a heroin overdose. He wasn't a long-term heroin user, nor was he aimless, unintelligent, unpopular,

unambitious, or any other stereotype you might associate with drug users.

It was very clear from the attention of our students and from their deep level of engagement, Tony's presentation was of deep interest to them. When asked to reflect on Tony's presentation, our student's impressions included:

- "I found Tony's story very sad, but it has educated me on the effects of drug use and the impact it can have on other people."
- "Tony's presentation changed some of my stereotypes around drug users and drug abuse."
- "Tony's experience would have been very traumatic to face first hand. From hearing Tony reflect on Damien and the pathway he took, I've learnt more about the destructive nature of drugs, particularly alcohol, heroin and ice."
- "I found Tony's story very sad and eye opening. It has given me an example of what addictive drugs can do and how they can ruin your life."

I believe you can never do too much education around drug and alcohol use and young people. Tony's presentation allows our students to view the world of drugs and drug dependency through a very different lens. One of the many aims of MacKillop Catholic College is to keep our students safe, both now and in the future. I would like to thank Tony Trimingham for helping MacKillop in this objective. I know that hosting presenters like Tony help to best position our students to make informed choices, to stay safe around drugs and alcohol, and to enhance the quality of their lives.
