The winds of change sometimes surprise us

College Principal, Steve Todd, reflects on the changing of the guard.

IT IS AN old saying that the 'winds of change' sometimes blow gently and at other times take us completely by surprise. Since the start of Term 3 in July, there have been a few announcements that bring an unexpected change to the guard here in leadership.

Our term started with the announcement that Frank Cohen would be the next Primary Principal for MacKillop at the start of 2020. This was timely news and one we were expecting to happen and then, over the next two weeks some news did come out of left field. We were somewhat shocked by a couple of the announcements. The first was the announcement that our Director of Schools, Peter Hamill, would be leaving us in early August to take up a new role as Assistant Director for the National Catholic Education Commission. As Peter has led the CSO for the past 8 years he was seen as a very entrenched figure there with much to offer Catholic education in the near future. The change to the national stage highlights Peter's interest and influence on the bigger scene for the future of Catholic School education. We wish Peter Hamill every blessing for his new role.

Whilst the dust was settling on these announcements, we also heard the news that our Primary REC, Kerry Power, was appointed as an Education Officer at the CSO, also starting in August. This role will be a secondment until the end of the year, but we are realistic in our view, that this role may well lead into a full-time position in

2020. We farewelled Kerry on the 12 August and welcomed a new Acting REC for the Primary for the remainder of the year in Tim Snelling. Tim has been part of our College for many years and his personal gifts and faith will be warmly welcomed at the College.

Whilst I am on the topic of change to leadership, we have also welcomed two new College Captains, a new student cabinet and Parliament leaders for 2019/20. Our outgoing leaders in College Captains, Lucy Pratt and Jack Baresic, now have to focus their attention on their trial exams and then the HSC. So, we now have a changeover of leaders to allow continuity of student leadership. We are extremely grateful to Lucy, Jack and all the student leaders for this year and we wish them all the very best with their preparations for the HSC in October/November. The Year 12 Graduation Mass and Awards Night will be held at the end of Term 3.

We are also thrilled to see the next leadership group commissioned for 2019/20 and we warmly welcome Alexa Walker and Ryley Small to their new roles as College Captains for MacKillop. We know both of these students are widely admired across the College and we look forward to seeing them step up into this role over the coming year.

Our annual St Mary MacKillop Feast Day was celebrated with a wonderful College Mass, picnic and then the House Challenge spectacular. It is always a day to remember and the students put so much energy into preparing their whole House item. We always end the day with a sense of joy as there is something very, very special about this place that makes you feel a better person for all that happens here at MacKillop.

I COMMENCED THIS term by reminding students that half their school year is over and to truly reflect on what they had and had not achieved so far this year. Having received their half-yearly report, completed Parent Teacher interviews, submitted a number of assessment tasks and received a great deal of feedback, and being offered extra classes and help at break times by many of their teachers with classes offered to Year 12 students over the holidays, a time for reflection is needed.

Term 3 is a good time for the entire family to sit and discuss each child's goals and ambitions, to look at any data that is available through marks, comments, reports and meetings. It is so easy to just drift along and then find that so much has passed the student by.

Discussions about future jobs and careers may be way beyond the student's imagination as yet with many undecided about what they want to do but they all need healthy reminders and support to realise that they need to be developing skills for the future. Skills such as the ability to listen, to collaborate, to ask for help, to meet deadlines, to be reliable, trustworthy, respectful and punctual. They need to be able to follow instructions and to realise that individuality comes from within, not with the latest fashion. They need to learn how to organize their priorities and their time. They need to persevere even when they find something difficult or not to

their liking.

Students need to realise that each and every teacher wants them to succeed and that is why they push them so hard. That teachers come prepared every lesson, every day and continue to come back even when the student or class is showing little to no interest in learning because the teacher knows that education is vital for every human being and they are invested in teaching young people to soar.

So, I really believe that setting goals and having ambition is so necessary for each of our students. This is probably very obvious to us all but children need to be taught this. They need to be continually encouraged to keep trying, to plan, to have hope even when life becomes difficult and they need to know that giving up or getting their own way will never assist them to reach their goals. IT WAS SOMEWHAT of a shock to receive the news that our Director of Schools would be leaving us in early August. Peter Hamill who has been involved in Catholic education in various places across NSW has been appointed Assistant Director to the National Catholic Education Commission. The national scene for Catholic education will benefit greatly from the wisdom and focus of Peter Hamill. A number of staff attended Peter's farewell Mass and function held on Friday 2 August at Waitara. The following article taken from the August edition of Broken Bay News celebrates and thanks Peter Hamill for his valued contribution to our Catholic School system.

It is with regret that the Diocese of Broken Bay announces that Mr Peter Hamill has resigned as Director of Schools. Peter will take up a new role as Deputy Director, National Catholic Education Commission commencing Monday, 5 August 2019.

"Peter has made a magnificent contribution to the Diocese of Broken Bay and has been instrumental in developing what is a first-class Diocesan Schools System with remarkable leadership," said Very Rev Dr David Ranson, Diocesan Administrator.

"He has negotiated the school system through significant challenges, and always with careful discernment and astute management. In so doing, he has enjoyed the confidence of the leadership of the system at every level. His attention to school staff and their issues has been exemplary, as has his collaboration with all stakeholders in the field of education, particularly clergy and especially government."

Peter has had the significant role of overseeing 44 schools and their more than 11,000 staff and 16,000 students, who in

concert with teachers, students, their parents/ guardians, their priests and parish communities, work tirelessly to educate and form young people in Catholic life.

"A key focus for Peter has always been to ensure in our school system a sense of hospitality, enthusiasm and genuine endeavour, and to ensure that students not only achieve their academic best, but that their wellbeing and advancement in Catholic faith is nurtured," added Fr David.

Peter initially commenced work with the Diocese in early 2010 as the Assistant Director of Administration for the Catholic Schools Office (CSO). In February 2012, he was appointed to the role of Director of Schools by Bishop David L Walker, a position subsequently reaffirmed by Bishop Peter A Comensoli in 2018.

During his time as Director of Schools, Peter has been responsible for the more than 120 staff of the CSO as well as the 46 Principals of the Diocesan Schools System. Beyond the Diocese, Peter has also held significant roles. Currently he serves as a Director of CEnet and is Chair of the Conference of the NSW and ACT Diocesan Directors of Schools and he was a member of the Catholic Education Commission of NSW. He has been on a number of inter-diocesan committees, boards and has undertaken reviews for other dioceses.

Whilst the Diocese of Broken Bay is in a period of waiting for a new Bishop and given the critical role of our Diocesan Schools in the mission of our Diocese, the appointment of a new Director of Schools will be delayed until a new Bishop of Broken Bay is appointed. In the intervening period, Dr Tony Bracken, Assistant Director School Improvement, will take on the role of Acting Director of Schools.



JUMP expands its horizons

DURING THE LAST school holidays over 40 MCC students, their parents and staff attended our Birthing Kit Packing Day. There were many Year 7 students present which is fantastic, given that the JUMP program for this cohort doesn't officially begin for them until Term 4. It is evident that the JUMP culture is already embedded into these students and what it truly means to be a member of the MacKillop community. As a result of our collective efforts, we saved the lives of 20 mothers and their babies

Term 3 witnessed the start of three exciting new programs at the College. PAL (Primary Assisted Learning), the intergenerational program, as well as a collaborative project with Bunnings and Wyong Hospital. PAL is a partnership between Year 9 and Year 2 students. Each week these students meet and work together to complete an art installation which will be constructed in the Primary area later this term. The aim of the program is to develop the leadership skills of Year 9, and for our Year 2 students to feel more confident in a range of social settings, as well as to improve overall wellbeing. This has been a very successful initiative thus far and one we hope will continue in Term 4.

The 'inter-generational' program runs every Thursday afternoon during sport time. Year 8 students have been attending Uniting Nursing Home at Hamlyn Terrace. Activities

include paper planes, Indigenous art painted on boomerangs including an Aboriginal culture talk, a photography session as well as puzzles and gaming. The students have learned a great deal about the adversities some elderly face, particularly when in institutions; feelings of loneliness and isolation. Vicky Sanchez, the Activities Officer, boasts about the benefits of such a program explaining how "...the residents have thoroughly enjoyed the company of the students. Each week they can't wait for them to arrive. It gives the residents something to look forward to."

In Week 3 this term, seven Year 9 boys along with Mr Gasparotto were afforded an opportunity to assist with the refurbishment of a pediatric unit at Wyong Hospital. Bunnings Lake Haven, in collaboration with Taubmans and Lions Club Toukley worked in partnership to improve the site, in order to provide a more pleasant environment for the patients and their families who visit. Our students spent two days preparing surfaces, painting walls and door frames and offering assistance wherever needed. Our students helped to create a more inviting environment to those who visit the unit.

Our students are responding to many needs within our local and wider communities. We can all be proud of their wonderful achievements.

Hopefully everyone enjoyed the glorious start to Spring on Sunday for Father's Day. Thank you for taking the time to celebrate with us.
























100 days of kindergarten


Parent news


Natalie Tunstead fills us in on parent engagement.


