I somehow feel that the spirit of survival and goodness has kicked off our year together here at MacKillop. The amazing Welcome Mass allowed people to gather and celebrate what a Catholic Parish and College community can be. To see Kinder children cuddling their new MacKillop teddy bears in the company of their parents is such a great feeling. The Secondary students along with our staff organized a wonderful barbeque for families. I thank each and every person for their contribution to making the start of 2020 such a good one.

I take this opportunity again to welcome our Primary Principal, Frank Cohen. In the short time that Frank has been here, we can see he is keen to make students, staff and families feel very welcomed and connected. One of his early innovations was to introduce Parent/Teacher goalsetting meetings and they have certainly gone down very well with parents and teachers alike. New Primary Principal hits the ground running!

Frank Cohen, Primary Principal recounts his experience of the first six weeks at MacKillop and provides a little insight into education from his perspective.

"NOTHING IN THIS world can take the place of persistence.

Talent will not; nothing is more common than unsuccessful people with talent, Genius will not; unrewarded genius is almost a proverb." - Dr Seuss.

Quite possibly the greatest philosopher of all time is Dr Seuss. His popular children's books provide hidden gems of wise words we can all get something from.

Although I am an experienced Principal, it can be quite daunting to come to a new school with certain procedures and programs different to my previous experiences. I am, however, delighted in being able to join the MacKillop Catholic College family and want to thank everyone for making me feel very welcome

I am passionate about education, but in particular children doing and giving of their best. Not all of us can win the gifted and most abled gene lottery and we have to persevere in order to achieve. Being the proud father of three children I know the struggles associated with having children who don't get things the first time around. I also know that school is not for everyone, but that everyone needs to go to school. What I do know is that every child can learn and every child can succeed. It is the goal for every teacher to achieve one year's growth as a minimum for each child.

The world of today is vastly different from the world when I was a child. In some respects, the innocence is gone and it

is a fast-paced time where innovations and technology are tracking at quicker rates than ever before. Children starting Kindergarten today are aptly named the Alpha Generation. These kids will see the 22nd Century in huge numbers and they are likely not to know what a fax machine or a DVD player are used for. They have access to machines such as iPads and smartphones that allow them to communicate to the world at the touch of a button and they can even stream worldwide events whilst sitting in their chairs at school.

These are exciting times requiring an education system that meets the needs now and well into the future. Teachers today must know the Zone of Proximal Development of learning for each child which is the zone where the teacher needs to take the child on the next step of the educational journey. Teachers must provide explicit instruction in key numeracy and literacy learning areas as well as facilitate learning in such a way to allow for students to engage with the subject matter. Search engines such as Google have replaced teachers when it comes to being all knowledgeable. Once a child is literate and numerate, the job of a teacher is to model discernment for the students so that each can justify understandings, collate and synthesise information and then apply it to the world in which each lives.

I am really thrilled to be here and look forward to working with the beautiful families that call MacKillop home.




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Commissioning of senior students

THE AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC Youth Festival (ACYF) is a biennial event for young Catholic Australians. It is organised through the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and provides the opportunity for young Catholics to engage in their faith on a deeper level, meet other young people from around the country, learn how to be active and dynamic disciples of Jesus and encounter the vitality of the Church in Australia today. ACYF 2019 was held in Perth from the 8th-10th December and while there were over 300 pilgrims from the Diocese of Broken Bay, MacKillop Catholic College was represented by twelve students from Years 10 and 11 with three staff and Sr Jennifer accompanying the students on this pilgrimage.

The school and parish groups from the Diocese of Broken Bay met daily to pray together, engage in small group reflections and interact with one another before heading to the festival together. The program of the festival was full and there was an abundance of activities to choose from. Each day began and ended with a plenary in the main auditorium of the Perth Convention Centre where pilgrims were addressed by church and community leaders, musicians and influential speakers. Pilgrims engaged in various sessions, workshops

and presentations that encouraged them to consider others in our society and reflect on their own faith journey. There were also different areas inside and around the convention centre. Musicians performed in various places, there were multiple 'chill-out' zones and opportunities to participate in the sacrament of Reconciliation and Adoration.

The Closing Mass on the final day of the festival was held outdoors and Charlie Martin was allocated to be a part of the offertory procession. While it was a nerve-wracking moment for Charlie, the entire Broken Bay group were extremely proud of him. Our final day in WA was spent at a theme park called Adventure World. It was a wonderful way for the MacKillop group to relax after three full days of ACYF. The day was spent on rides, water slides, rollercoasters and swimming. ACYF was truly a pilgrimage experience where challenges were encountered and overcome. The MacKillop students represented our community so well and the staff were so proud of them. Year 7 were also fortunate to participate in a workshop that explored the life of Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop. This workshop was led by Mrs Baxter and Mrs Price at the Northside Conference Centre. In these workshops the students explored the connections of their house values to the current work of the Sisters of Saint Joseph and how they can apply the charism of Mary MacKillop to their own lives today.

At the Sisters of Saint Joseph Spirituality Centre Kincumber, students had the opportunity to visit the museum and learn about the history of the centre. The students found the museum very interesting and were amazed about how the

boys lived there and how they were educated. Year 7 also had the opportunity to have a tour of the grounds and were told more about the history of the centre and how the boys loved playing sport and other activities on the grounds.

Following this, they participated in workshops and games facilitated by Mrs Tenev, Youth Ministry Leader. This allowed the students to reflect on what it means to be a MacKillop student.

The day ended with students gathering in the historical church where Sister Jennifer Canillas and Sister Marea Ross both spoke to them about their journeys in becoming a Sister and offered a Q&A session with the students.

A big thank you must go to all the students and staff who attended these two days and an extra big thank you to those who facilitated any of the workshops. This was a great opportunity for the students to see the importance of our patron Saint and how they can live out their daily lives with a Josephite heart.



An assuring HSC performance

Mel McGuinness proudly provides a snapshot of the 2019 HSC results.

MACKILLOP CATHOLIC COLLEGE proudly welcomes an assuring result from the HSC Class of 2019. Data is a useful tool for reflection and is best used when we ask ourselves questions and know the narrative behind that data. Our students have continued the fine performance of honour listings achieved by the previous HSC cohorts. A significant proportion of the candidature of the Class of 2019 has recorded a very credible HSC performance with 90% of all entries achieving Band 3 and above. The statistics are even more impressive with close to 64% of all listings representing Band 4 and above with a most commendable level of 26% of all listings representing the top two bands. It is worth noting the shift in the lower band ranges as well as the upper two bands.

What stands out is the close alignment with the bands over the past three years. The statistics are closely mirrored with the bottom two bands at a very low level. There is much to celebrate with the all-round quality of the HSC performances at the College. A significant number of HSC courses achieved above the State Mean – 57.1% courses in total. Furthermore 50% of extension courses were above state average. A range of courses continue to be among our best performed courses with over 2 average marks above the state mean. Our students have performed well above the state mean in these courses:

MacKillop hits the red carpet

IN FEBRUARY 2020, 18 students and 3 staff from MacKillop Catholic College, Warnervale, embarked on a two week Performing Arts skills tour of California. Leader of Learning and Teaching – Performing Arts, Mrs Sharon Baird, was excited to see this finally come to fruition after two years of planning. The group visited iconic places such as Disneyland, Universal Studios, Los Angeles and Hollywood, sang show tunes on the bus trips to Sacramento and San Francisco, learned new skills at a variety of workshops, and performed at the Junior Theatre Festival, Sacramento (JTFWest).

One of the main purposes of the tour was skills development and it was very clear, even halfway through the trip, that MacKillop students were improving in all areas of performance: dance, drama and music. Participating in a show choir workshop with triple threat, Shelly Nichol, at Disneyland, the students learned her mantra, "full out, first time, every time, all the time", and it stayed with the group throughout the trip. At Millennium Dance Complex, famous for choreographing dance videos for artists such as Britney Spears and N*SYNC, our students took the challenge and learned a technically difficult jazz funk routine and shone brightly. From all of their tour workshops, not only have they grown in confidence, but students were able to refine their vocal and dance skills, to create more of a presence on stage.

The key element, or raison d'être, for the trip was MacKillop Catholic College's entry into the JTFWest, where over 2000 young performers from all over the world came together to celebrate musical theatre and performed excerpts from Broadway and Disney Junior musicals. MacKillop performed

an excerpt of The Little Mermaid Junior, a production that the group had been working hard on for the last two years. They performed under the adjudication of Jeff Calhoun (Between The Lines), Rob Rokicki (The Lightning Thief: The Percy Jackson Musical) and Amanda Flynn (actress, singer and musical theatre educator) in front of other international student theatre groups. They did themselves, MacKillop and their families proud drawing cheers from the crowd and a standing ovation.

During JTFWest, MacKillop was honoured to have four students acknowledged for their skills and talent: Trinity Young and Megan Trigg were selected as Festival All-Stars and performed 'Freak Flag' from Shrek the Musical Junior with other international All-Stars during the Awards Ceremony; Jade McDonald and Tayla Brooker auditioned with 300 other international students for a chance to be cast in a choreography video for upcoming Broadway Junior titles and were among 70 students selected for callbacks. To top it all off, Trinity Young received an Award for Outstanding Individual Performance, as one of only five students who were awarded this accolade.

Jade, Year 10, summarised the feeling across the whole student group, "It was such an amazing trip and all the opportunities that were provided, just wow...you certainly made my dream come true. I certainly won't forget any part of it". Mrs Baird praised all 18 students for their consistent enthusiasm and quality talent as they represented the College, "I am one very proud Drama teacher!"



An appropriation of Jenny Holzer's work, "Living", Rosie's creation "is an encapsulation of the world's consumerism, competition for attention, social media addiction, the implications of the use of Al (artificial intelligence) within social media, and the anxiety felt by its users. The soundscape was inspired by the loud, anxious, soul sucking, time wasting feeling, often created by social media. The soundscape incorporates a number of layers of sound including: message tones, a large crowd, ticking clock, recordings of electrical interference and a dial up tone."

Science alliance

DURING AN INCURSION on Thursday 5 March, Science Alliance students were presented with a scenario where a victim is found dead and foul play was suspected:

An 18-year-old boy is arrested for the murder which he claims to know nothing about. However, drugs, a gun and a stash of money were found at the home of the accused which all point to his guilt!

Students wore specialist forensics attire to examine the crime scene and interpreted a range of evidence undertaken by forensic investigators, including arson, DNA, fabric analysis, blood spatter, fingerprinting, tire tread and ballistic (gunshot residues) to solve the crime. The students were able to roleplay the events of the murder after they had decided on who the murderer was and their motive.

The incursion covered serious social and community issues as an undertone to the storyline. The case also discussed drug awareness and the impacts of hanging out with the wrong crowd. The presentation allowed an open dialogue amongst students and their presenter which resulted in an exciting and engaging experience.
