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### College Principal's message

College Principal, Jason Hanrahan, reflects on a wonderful Term 3 at MacKillop.

AS WE CONCLUDE Term 3, it is an appropriate time to reflect upon the past ten weeks. Our College community, and the wider community, have continued to address the multiple challenges presented by the ongoing pandemic, all the while working assiduously in ensuring school days are as 'normal' as possible and our students can experience the full life of a busy K-12 College, which has not been possible in the past two years.

As mentioned above, like all other schools and colleges across NSW and Australia, we have been dealing with the ongoing challenges of the pandemic. Earlier in the term, during the colder winter months, the challenge reached a crescendo as we were faced with the ongoing absence of a number of staff and students. COVID was one reason for the absences however, not the major factor. Other strains of influenza, colds and respiratory illnesses had a significant impact on the normal operation of a learning environment. We were faced with the challenges of covering classes and again our staff went above and beyond in assisting our colleagues, so the students had as normal an experience of learning as possible during that period of time. As the numbers of COVID drop so have the numbers of staff and students absent, hopefully leading to a better end to Term 3 and start to Term 4.

Term 3 is a busy term for many of our students and prospective students. Our Year 12 students and staff are

preparing for the completion of their HSC Courses and the HSC examinations to be held in October-November next term. Year 12 completed their Trial HSC examination in Weeks 3-5, a stressful time for them as they complete examinations without the lead in period that the HSC affords. I want to take this time to thank our Year 12's for the enormous contribution they have made to our College over, for many of the students, thirteen years. They have seen many changes to our school and have been through the change of three College Principals. Congratulations to Year 12 and we wish them well as they approach the HSC examinations.

At the other end of their formal school learning journey, our Kinder Yana program has commenced this term. We have for the first time four classes in kindergarten for 2023, with over 100 students accepted for enrolment next year. The Kinder Yana program is a transition to kindergarten program that has been incredibly successful. It is a wonderful program to ensure our new Kindergarten students are as prepared as possible for the start of school at MacKillop in 2023. Thank you to our Kindergarten teachers for 2023, to our administration staff and Primary leadership for the work you put into this program to ensure it is a success.

I thank our families for your support as we have continued our way through the term, and as we approach the final term of the year.

















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### Cup runneth over

Term 3 has been a very full term of learning, shares Frank Cohen, Primary Principal.

THE ACCELERATOR WAS certainly pressed to full throttle this term. Never has there been a calendar so full of learning tasks, competitions, events and so much to achieve in such a short space of time. John Lennon famously wrote the lyrics: "Life is what happens while you are making plans." Quite prophetic and fitting for the students and staff at MacKillop this term. We began with NAIDOC week and the students loved being in their K-6 clans to participate in indigenous activities.

The staff also participated in the five yearly annual educational audit review, where much work behind the scenes including most weekends took place. We passed the review with flying colours and many commendations. All teachers did exceptional work in preparing for such an intrusive and arduous event.

We welcomed 104 Kinder Yana students who took part in 4 investigative play-based mornings to prepare for big school. The key to this process is that parents are asked to be with their child as they socially construct the tasks. Bonds of friendship are beginning to be formed and parents and children loved the time together. What was really heartening to observe was the number of dads who took time off work to be with their pre-schooler.

Students participated in a wonderful Father's Day mass,

breakfast and open classrooms. The children always love having parents come and visit them in their school workplace. It was wonderful to acknowledge the great men we have in our community.

Throughout the term the students were able to participate in multiple learning experiences on top of their normal class routines. These included such things as Happy Healthy Harold, Tournament of the Minds competition in Newcastle, ICAS tests, Gala Days, Representative football codes and athletics. There was a fabulous Book Week parade and read alouds, as well as public speaking competitions where the standard gets better every year. Children returned to weekday parish masses again after the covid lock outs and we farewelled our beautiful Sr Marea acknowledging the tremendous work she has done in our community, dedicating so much time to helping our families in need.

As the term comes to an end, we are very excited to know that our new school building plans are one step closer to reality. We also are ready to welcome a fourth stream of kindergarten in 2023 with the name unveiling very imminent.

Students, parents and staff can justifiably be proud of the collective efforts of all and can head off into the spring break for a well-deserved rest!



### Joyful, joyful

**Secondary Principal, Debra Ferguson,** says every day is exciting, interesting, challenging and a joy.

HERE WE ARE at the end of Term 3 with more than half of the year's learning time completed. It is a time for students to reflect on how well they have applied themselves, and see if they can improve upon this for the last term of the year. It is also a time for the school teachers and staff to reflect on how effective they have been on challenging and developing our students.

This year we have been acutely aware that re-establishing our strong community culture and learning has been our focus. Our students have missed so much over the past 2 years and their routines have been gravely interrupted. We have noticed simple things such as a lack of real connection to each other, missed growing opportunities in their social lives of how to overcome and deal with conflict, a lack of completing homework and learning preparation, and a sense of trepidation and reluctance about trying new things.

The good news is we are starting to see a change and our students and staff are creating new and strong connections. This has not just occurred by good luck but through hard work by everyone. Our dedicated teachers have established strong classroom routines with high expectations whilst learning themselves through dedicated literacy training and planning for student achievement.

Our Principals have all been engaged in meeting with mentors and our Executive teams have been undergoing Professional Learning with the esteemed Linda Bendikson from New Zealand who is working with us all for continuous school improvement for student learning.

Our Middle Leaders and teachers have identified students who require extra assistance and we are continuing to have extra teachers in classrooms to assist with literacy and numeracy which is covered by COVID money from the Government. Differentiating lessons and using strong teaching methods of giving students time to think and research, whilst teachers work with students in class in small groups and individually, all work towards improved learning.

Being able to attend camps, reflection days, spirituality days, retreats, sporting events, dance, drama and music competitions as well as other activities at school is slowly rebuilding student connections and behaviour expectations.

We have been working very hard to ensure students are attending school more regularly. The expectation is that all students are at school at least 92% of the year. We are still feeling the effects of COVID and influenza and just not being able to attend school if symptoms appear, but we need to ensure that missing school does not become a habit.

We have a school of 900 teenagers so every day is exciting, interesting, challenging and a joy. We all need to keep working hard to reach all our potential - students and staff - and to continue to be the safe and happy school we have always been known for.

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### Tribute to Sr Marea Ross rsj

Steve Todd, Former College Principal, and Deb Ferguson, Secondary Principal pay tribute to Sr Marea Ross - A Josephite and MacKillop Treasure.

IT IS INDEED a privilege to offer a tribute on the life and ministry of our Sr Marea. On the Feast Day of St. Mary MacKillop we celebrated Sr Marea's significant journey as a Sister of St. Joseph as she formally retired from Catholic education. It was fitting that Sr Marea selected the Feast of Mary MacKillop (8th August) to retire, as it is with gratitude that we celebrate this feast day in recognising our patron saint in St. Mary MacKillop and to also give thanks for Sr Marea's ministry of over 60 years. It was Mary MacKillop who once wrote, 'Gratitude is the memory of the heart' and it is with grateful hearts that we say farewell to a wonderfully faithful servant to the Lord and as a Sister of St. Joseph in our friend Sr. Marea Ross.

A favourite movie from childhood was 'The Sound of Music' and the main character of that movie was Maria Von Trapp who loved climbing the hills and frolicking across the countryside even losing track of time and ending up running late for evening prayers. A song titled, 'How do you solve a problem like Maria?' happily resonated around the Abbey. Well, in many hilarious ways this could be the theme song for our Sr Marea Ross – a Josephite Sister who saw no boundaries or limitations in the way she went about meeting people that looked to her for reassurance, protection and care, as this has been her calling right from the beginning.

Sr Marea's family story begins in the local hillside of Mittagong on the NSW Southern Highlands where her happy and loving family life allowed her to roam about the countryside to take in all the blessings of country living. A happily joyful person in Marea Ross looked across her family house fence into the schoolyard next door. Marea was known as 'Possum Ross' as she was often sitting on the fence watching the children play. It was Marea's adventurous spirit that saw her make her first visit to a classroom at 3 or 4 years of age. Her educational story had commenced!

The calling of a very young teenage girl to become a Sister of St. Joseph was a profound moment in Marea's life (some doubted it would last but, Marea saw the adventure and she happily gave it a go). Following in the footsteps of her older sister Ruth, she has devoted over 60 years of her life as a Sister. Marea knew the motto and message of both Mary MacKillop and Julian Tenison Woods to 'respond to needs'. Marea wanted to make a difference in the lives of others, especially for children and even more so for people and families struggling with life's everyday demands. Marea was a dedicated and talented teacher much like Mary MacKillop and soon at a relatively young age became a Primary School Principal. After nearly 60 years in Catholic education with 25 of those years as a Principal and, then for the past 20 years as a Josephite Pastoral Supporter of MacKillop Catholic College, Warnervale. Simply, Marea loved people and always wanted children and families to know that God loved them too through practical ways of offering them hope. Marea did not care much for rules and excuses for not doing things as she knew what was right in her Josephite heart. For many of us working alongside Marea we just trusted her judgement and accepted she was doing Mary MacKillop's work. We didn't need to know anything else. Not everyone understands this, and it did present a few challenges to Sr Marea along the way but, did not the same thing happen to Mary MacKillop.

It was here at Warnervale where Sr Marea responded to Stephen Aitken's invitation to 'come and help me start a new school of hope and promise on the Central Coast.' Well, Marea did that with great gusto as she stood on this ancient Darkinjung land way back in 2003, looked up at the night sky to see the Southern Cross and then across to the coast to the Norah Head Lighthouse to understand the calling of the College's motto of 'Christ Our Light'. Sr Marea had found a new home here at MacKillop Warnervale.

What was to develop here truly was a Josephite spirit and heart that now belongs to us all. Sr Marea has walked this path with us through so many social justice and service projects – Mini Vinnies, Mini Macs, Seasons of Hope, Easter & Christmas Appeals, Second-Hand Uniform Shop, Home visitations, food hampers, the Food Store. A number of these projects have helped shape the Secondary JUMP Program that calls every student to nurture their Josephite heart. The number of graduation cards and messages to both Yr 6 and Yr 12 always highlighted to the students that Sr Marea was in their corner. Kinders and Yr 7s first days each year were a

focus of Sr. Marea's attention and there are many a photo of those beginning days in family albums. Whenever Sr Marea was asked to say Grace at an event, she would always take the time to offer some additional insight or offer a little story to encourage us all. Marea is a creatively talented person as a writer, artist and with many other crafts.

Sr Marea knows that she will always have a home here at MacKillop and we hold her very dearly as a life-long friend.

Take care and keep that happy and joyful spirit going as this was your gift from the very beginning – Go well Possum Ross.

So finally thank you all. I am proud to have shared the last twenty years with you and my final prayer is God Bless you all!













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












### Parish update

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### JUMP comes Full Circle

We are so proud of our pioneer students, and how they have come full circle, shares Michelle Baxter.

IN 2017, AN excited and very eager group of Year 7 students began their outreach and volunteer journey as part of the Josephites Undertaking Mission Project; otherwise known as JUMP. This amazing group of young people were our guinea pigs who bravely navigated their way through the program and pioneered a culture of servant leadership, demonstrating what it truly means to be a Josephite through their actions and spirit.

Social justice is a central part of the formation of our young people at MCC. It is underpinned by the credo of St. Mary of the Cross MacKillop, to "Never see a need without doing something about it." We encourage our students' to be of service to others through many initiatives both within the school context and beyond to build healthier and well-connected communities. Initiatives have included: volunteering at Coast Shelter, St. Vincent de Paul activities, Youth Ministry, working with the homeless, visits to nursing homes and involvement in local charities, PAL (Primary Assisted Learning), attending Oasis Centre Wyong, the Ghana Appeal, Zonta Birthing Kits, White Ribbon rallies, Surf Life Saving patrol, as well as coaching local sporting teams. These are just some of the many examples our students have participated in over the last 6 years.

The first few years of the JUMP Program were spent working through a few teething issues; developing and constructing ways to document student participation in the numerous events offered at the College as well as activities they were also engaged with outside of school. We initially modelled our service program on St Eddie's at East Gosford's Waterford Program, but quickly sought to make the program our own. We moved away from paper entries to log service work, to an online Google Classroom format, now with the current format utilising COMPASS as the most efficient and effective platform for documenting log sheets. Our current Year 12's have experienced it all and continue to partake in the program even though it is not compulsory for them.

JUMP is very much at the heart of who we are as MacKillop people. The graduating class of 2022 have been instrumental leaders and exemplary role models to our junior students as part of this program. It is with much gratitude and appreciation that we acknowledge their service and ongoing commitment to helping others, especially those in our community who are less fortunate.

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### Coast Shelter Sleepout

**COAST SHELTER PROVIDES** support services for those experiencing domestic and family violence and homelessness. Our students have an association with Coast Shelter and frequently volunteer at the centre in Gosford where they cook and serve lunch on a given day.

On the twlelth day of Yana, the children brought along, readiness, eagerness and calm.











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# Anxiety and supporting your children through it

**Natasha Harman** *encourages parents to be proactive in supporting your children during tough times.* 

**ANXIETY CAN BE** a debilitating issue for anyone, including adults. Knowing the signs can help you to tune into your child and help them manage it before it gets out of control.

Whoever the child is attached to will be the ones they will come to for support, or if they can't get help to manage emotions and big feelings, they may act out or you will see big behaviours that may result in not so positive outcomes leaving you both distressed and exhausted. This ongoing cycle will not bring you closer to your child, it will only chip away at your relationship and this is the exact opposite of what the child needs from you, the parent/carer.

When a child acts out or displays big emotions, this is your "cue" to help them. Kids don't wake up each day with the quota of how many times they can get into trouble in one day. So be on the lookout for the cues your child presents to you and take a breath before you dive in to help them unpack feelings and emotions so that you can help them through it and not join in on their chaos.

Being calm yourself is the only way you can calm an anxious, frightened, worried child/teen, so take time out or a time in with the child and let them know you're there for them and you will help them. The child will feed off your anxiety, and so when

the parent is calm, the child will learn to be calm too.

Teaching your child to be resilient is an ongoing conversation, so make use of the "What ifs" - these are questions/situations you pose to your child when they are calm and not escalated. Asking questions when they're calm about situations you know might be an issue for them in real life. Eg, "Suzie, what would you do if you got to the classroom and no one was there?". Suzie would be able to tell you the answer in a calm moment but perhaps if Suzie went to the classroom and was caught off guard, she may not be able to know the answer in that moment and this may cause her to panic. When a child (or even an adult) panics, they flip their lid and the thinking brain is no longer in control and the person will then be running off their emotions. This is called "fight or flight" moments.

Giving children/teens the opportunity to discuss situations like this in a calm moment helps them to learn to trust themselves that they do know what to do in these moments and that they will get through things if they just stop and think and not get caught up in the panic and fear. They will also learn to know the feelings anxiety creates for them and they will be able to name it so they can learn to tame it.
